Pastor's Corner:



This Year I Am Going to Change!

Change is one of the most controversial issues in almost any organization (or church.)

There's something inside you and me that clings to the status quo, hoping it will work one more time, even if it hasn't worked in a long time.

Sometimes the need for change is obvious. If nothing has changed since 1962, the case for change presents itself.

But often it's more subtle than that. I want to share from one of my favorite authors who describes the dilemma we face as a church.

Leaders spend a surprising amount of time trying to convince church members change is really that necessary.

But leaders are human too. We've seen how change has swallowed colleagues alive. We've watched great leaders suffer as they met all kinds of opposition. We sense the conflict pending in our own community.

So we ignore the signs that would tell us change is

needed.

So, how do you know your organization or our church needs to change? How do you stay 100 percent honest as a leader and engage the difficult issues?

Answer: You constantly watch for the signs you need to change.

What are those signs? Well, there are plenty of them.

Change needs to happen on a macro-level, and it also needs to happen on a micro-level. Because the need for change almost inevitably means some level of conflict, it's easy for a leader to move into denial—to pretend the status quo isn't really that bad.

But great leaders don't run when they see a need for change. They embrace it and demonstrate the courage needed to navigate the change required.

So how do you know if your (our) church needs to change? At the macro- and micro-level, here are 21 signs your church needs to change:

- 1. Your stories are about what used to happen, not what's going to happen. You need to change because your memories exceed your dreams.
- 2. You're still growing, but any real innovation has stopped. Every season has a shelf life. Smart leaders prepare for the next season before the current one expires.

- **3.** Your team is misaligned. This means you need to change your culture. Misaligned organizations will always struggle with organizational health and unity in purpose and mission.
- **4.** Your growth is mostly transfer growth. You're missing your mission. Enough said.
- **5.** The number of baptisms has slowed. Signs like this are the canary in the coal mine.
- **6.** You think about the obstacles associated with the future more than you think about the opportunities.

Interpretation: This kind of thinking breeds a culture of fear.

Decline is right around the corner, if not already present.

- **7.** Your volunteer turnover is too high. Something needs to change in your volunteer culture or structure.
- 8. Your volunteer turnover is too low.

Interpretation: Something needs to change because you have no room for new people. Many dying churches have the same people serving in the same role for decades.

- **9.** You're not hearing stories of life change. Stories are the currency of effectiveness.
- **10.** You haven't done anything exciting in the last six months. Stagnation starts subtly.
- **11.** You're not offending people. Organizations that make a difference always anger someone. Just make sure you're offending the right people.

Winnemucca Seventh-day Adventist Church Plans For Future

"Those that fail to plan ahead, plan to fail." Words of wisdom for sure. Even Jesus agreed with this principle when he illustrated this point with an object lesson in Luke 14:28-30: "If one of you wanted to build a tower, wouldn't you first sit down and calculate the cost, to determine whether you have enough money to complete it? ²⁹ Otherwise, when you have laid the foundation but couldn't finish the tower, all who see it will begin to belittle you. ³⁰ They will say, 'Here's the person who began construction and couldn't complete it!'

Last fall, the members of the Winnemucca Seventh-day Adventist Church spent one afternoon of the Fall Rye Patch Retreat contemplating, brainstorming, and envisioning the mission and future of our church in Northern Nevada. Groups of no more than three sequestered themselves around rolls of blank butcher paper and dreamed of a 5-Year Plan which will serve as the blueprint for the mission and vision of our church family.

The results of that exercise have been tabulated and will be presented to the Winnemucca Seventh-day Adventist Church Board for consideration. The Board's task will be to refine the Retreat's brainstorming into a presentation which will be brought before the next Church Busi-

ness Meeting in the Spring.

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A few church members have questioned the significance and purpose of a 5-Year Plan. "If our church has gotten by for all these many years without a vision or plan for the future, why should we waste our time and energy planning for the future when either I don't care, or I'm not going to get involved anyway, or I'm happy with way the things

After all, doing nothing has resulted in negative growth over the last ten years. Jesus commands us to work in the fields now, for the harvest is plentiful and time is short. Let's all get to work and dream big for God!"

Elko Talent Show



- **18.** Your passion level is average-to-low. Declining organizations always lack passion.
- **19.** You don't look like your community. Churches that have become a subculture look like themselves, not like their community.
- **20.** Talk doesn't translate to action. Most of your decisions result in nothing significant.

Interpretation: Check your progress

more than you check your intentions.

21. You're still breathing. Change is a constant. The day we stop changing is the day we begin to die.

How many of the 21 principles raised your attention?

Looking back at 2012 and our mission to our community, do we want to continue in the same path with the same results or are we finally ready to make some changes?

The PUC Recorder will also include an invitation to all former members to attend.


Winnemucca Membership Audit Ready for March *PUC Recorder*
